English Department College Prep English Grade 11

Course Description:

This course focuses on the development and mastery of reading and writing, with an emphasis on American literature and composition. The 11th grade curriculum consists of reading and analyzing a variety of literature including novels, novel excerpts, short stories, poetry, and two drama pieces. The course also explores informational works of literature, including speeches, essays, nonfiction articles, and other primary sources. Students will read, analyze, interpret, and evaluate works of American authors, and will share their understanding through discussions and writing assignments. The writing component of the course emphasizes the techniques of writing expository essays with stress upon careful thinking, word choice, sentence structure, and methods of organization. Students practice the writing of clear, coherent, and unified paragraphs and essays. Students will spend the year developing and editing their writing through a variety of essays, including numerous literary analysis essays, a personal narrative, a descriptive essay, a compare and contrast essay, a cause-and-effect or example essay, and an argumentative essay supported by research. Assignments are specifically designed around the PA Common Core Standards and early college criteria and are assessed using scoring rubrics. Please see below for a concise outline of the course.
